Class 11 & 12	Gastrointestinal System (inflammatory bowel syndrome (IBS), appendicitis, colorectal cancer, peptic ulcer disease and bowel obstructions)
Class 13	Accessory Organs of Gastrointestinal System (cholecystitis, cholelithiasis, pancreatitis, liver cirrhosis, liver and pancreatic cancers and hepatitis)
Class 14	Immune System (AIDS, HIV and emerging infections)
Class 15	Consolidation
Class 16	Exam #2
Class 17 & 18	Nervous System (increased intracranial pressure (ICP), head injuries, brain tumours and spinal cord injuries)
Class 19	Haematological System (to sickle cell anemia, hemolytic anemia, aplastic anemia, hemophilia, thrombocytopenia, lymphoma, multiple myeloma and acute/chronic leukemia)
