- Describe colonization and the impact of this process on Indigenous Peoples of BC and Canada and on your experience with Indigenous Peoples;
- Evaluate and articulate the ways in which your values and beliefs align or conflict with Indigenous ways of seeing, being, doing, and relating;
- Identify and describe similarities and differences between, and across, Indigenous worldviews and settler worldviews.
- Identify and build on practices/ways that foster mutually respectful relationships in community and the workplace.

Assignment #1 – Reflection Essay (25%)

Due: on or before Saturday September 26th 2020 by 11:59PM

Student will submit a 4-6 paged (max 8 pages) fully typed, self-reflection APA-formatted essay (plus a separate title page and reference page; not counted in the page limit) responding to the following, based on the course materials (readings, websites, videos), online lectures, and virtual classroom sessions thus far:

Section #1: Self-Location Introduction (2%)

Provide a Self-Location Introduction as discussed in week #1

Section #2: Territorial Acknowledgement (5%)

Provide a *Territorial Acknowledgement* as discussed in week #2, and discuss what this territorial acknowledgement means to you as a non-Indigenous or Indigenous person accordingly.

Section #3: Creation Stories (4%)

Select at least one *Indigenous Creation Stories* that stood out to you from week #3 and compare this to Canada's creation story, and discuss some of the thoughts and feelings that come up for you when you comparing these two perspectives?

Section #4: Self-Care and Wellness Plan (6%)

The history between Indigenous Peoples and Canada is very dark, and can be triggering for some students emotionally, mentally, physically, and spiritually. It is important to have a *Self-Care and Wellness Plan* in place for the remainder of the course. Please discuss how you will attend to your self-care and wellness needs. Note that some weeks in the course have 'content warnings'.

Clarity, Structure, and Organization and Adherence to Assignment Requirements (4%):

To help with organization, students are <u>highly</u> encouraged to use *sub-heading* (no more than one sentence each) above each section of their paper (for example, *Section #1: Self-Location Introduction, Section #2: Territorial Acknowledgement, Section #3: Creation Stories, Section #4: Self-Care and Wellness Plan).* Students must also include <u>at least 4 internal sources</u> from the course material (readings, websites, videos, etc) thus far.

APA-Formatting (4%):

Paper format, in-text citations, and reference page.

Assignment Dropbox: assignments will be submitted to the appropriate assignment dropbox located in the 'Assignment' tab on D2L as a Word document (.docx) or PDF only. Please note that external links to assignments such as google documents will not be accepted for marking.

Late Penalties: -5% deduction from the overall assignment grade for <u>each day</u> that the assignment is late, up to a maximum of 10-days, after which point assignments will not be accepted for marking.

Assignment #2 – Learning Synthesis (30%)

Due: on or before Saturday October 24 2020 by 11:59PM

Students will submit a 5-7 paged (max 8 paged) fully typed, APA-formatted *Learning Synthesis* (plus a separate title page and reference page) responding to each of the following sections, and based on the course materials (readings, websites, videos), online lectures, and virtual classroom session <u>from week 4-7 only</u>.

Section #1: Summary of Course Materials (8%)

Provide a summary of the course materials (readings, videos, websites) stood out to you from weeks 4-7.

Section #2: Learning Synthesis (7%)

Provide a synthesis of what you learned from the above course materials:

Note that a *Learning Synthesis* is a synthesis of your *learning* and <u>not</u> a summary of what your read/watched, nor is it a reiteration of the course materials itself. In other words, a learning synthesis is a description of how your thoughts and perceptions and feelings have been changed as a result of the course materials from weeks 4-7.

Section #3: Application (7%)

Now that you have *completed* weeks 4-7, discuss how you will apply this new knowledge to your personal life, professional practice, and academic studies going forward.

Clarity, Structure, and Organization and Adherence to Assignment Requirements (4%):

To help with organization, students are <u>highly</u> encouraged to use *sub-heading* (no more than one sentence each) above each section of their paper (for example, *Section #1: Summary of Reviewed Course Materials, Section #2: Learning Synthesis; Section #3 Application*). Students must also include at least 5 internal sources from weeks #4-7.

APA-Formatting (4%):

Paper format, in-text citations, and reference page.

Late Penalties: -5% deduction from the overall assignment grade for <u>each day</u> that the assignment is late, up to a maximum of 10-days, after which point assignments will not be accepted for marking.

Student will submit a 6-8 <u>typed</u> paged (max 10 paged) APA-formatted *Pictorial Analysis* (plus a separate title page and reference page) responding to each of the following sections based on all course materials (readings, websites, videos), online lectures, and virtual classroom sessions.

It is important that student think of this final assignment as an *open-book exam for the entire course*.

Section #1: *Colonization* (7%)

Select an image (or create an image) representing the *Colonization of Indigenous Peoples in Canada* (weeks 4-6) and provide a rationale for your image-selection and a critical analysis.

Section #2: Decolonization/Indigenization and Reconciliation (7%)

Select an image (or create an image) representing the *Decolonization/Indigenization and Reconciliation* (weeks 7-8, and 12-13) and provide a rationale for your image-selection and a critical analysis

Section #3: Allyship with/for Indigenous Peoples (7%)

Select an image (or create an image) representing the *Decolonization/Indigenization and Reconciliation* (weeks 9-11) and provide a rationale for your image-selection and a critical analysis

Section #4: *Application* (6%)

Now that you have completed the course, discuss how you will apply all of this new knowledge to your personal life, professional practice, and/or academic studies going forward. Use plenty of first-person personal statements ("I-statements") and include clear and specific examples.

Clarity, Structure, and Organization and Adherence to Assignment Requirements (4%):

To help with organization, students are highly encouraged to use *sub-heading* (no more than one sentence each) above each section of their paper (for example, *Section #1: Colonization, Section #2: Decolonization/Indigenization; Section #3: Allyship; Section #4: Application)*. Students must also include <u>at least 6 internal sources</u> from the course materials (readings, videos, websites, etc).

APA-Formatting (4%):

Paper format, in-text citations, and reference page.

Unfortunately, there can be no deadline extensions for this assignment due to the short turnaround time in which final grades must be submitted to the college. Regular late penalties will apply; however, no assignments will be accepted 48-hours after the above due date. If this is concern, please notify your Instructor immediately.
